Brothers,



PATRIOTS' DAY

Patriots' Day is an annual event, formalized as a legal holiday or a special observance day in the states of Massachusetts, Maine, Florida, Wisconsin, Connecticut, and North Dakota. It commemorates the battles of Lexington, Concord, and Menotomy in 1775, some of the first battles of the Revolutionary War. The holiday occurs on the third Monday of April each year, except in Florida and Wisconsin, which observe it on April 19th, the actual anniversary of the battles. Celebrations include battle reenactments and the Boston Marathon. The following is a 19th Century poem commemorating the day:

The Nineteenth of April

by Joseph A. Watson

What old North Ender, born below

The chimes of Christ Church steeple,

But feels within his bosom glow

The soul of those brave people.

Who, farther back than "seventy-six,"

Were vexed about some taxes,

And put King George in such a fix

30th Annual Encampment of the Department of Texas and Louisiana

Brothers,

We are now making final preparations for the 30th Annual Encampment of the Department of Texas and Louisiana. Once again, we will be following the rich historical traditions and rituals of our Order and the G.A.R. Many elements of the program were established by our forefathers and had great meaning and import to them. Our commitment to honoring their memory and legacy will be reflected in the content and conduct of our upcoming Encampment.

Attire

As with any formal SUVCW function, proper attire and decorum are expected. Attendees should either wear a 'civilian' uniform - consisting of a navy-colored blazer or sport coat, gray slacks, black shoes, a light-colored dress shirt, and a tie (ties with the SUVCW logo are available for purchase online at the SUVCW Quartermaster store). You may optionally complement the 'civilian' uniform with a Union kepi or slouch hat. In place of a blazer or sport coat, it is acceptable to instead wear a navy-colored Union vest with kepi or slouch hat.

Attendees may also wear a complete Civil War-era uniform if they choose. Brothers having active roles in the program, such as the Guard, Guide, Color Bearer, etc., are encouraged to properly 'roll play' the part by wearing a period-correct uniform. But again, wearing a 'military' uniform is optional.

Your SUVCW membership badge should be proudly attached to the left breast of your jacket or vest.

Registration and Credentialing

Any Brother in good standing can attend the Encampment. If you have not pre-registered, we will make it possible for you to remit the registration fee and obtain a credentials card at the door. Only those with proper credentials will be allowed into the Encampment room. Be sure to bring your current Membership Card.

A finite number of elected voting Delegates are allowed from each Camp. If you are not an elected Delegate, and therefore cannot vote, you are still encouraged to attend in-person and participate in discussions and voice your opinions. You may be 'promoted' to voting Delegate status if a vacancy is created due to the absence of an elected Delegate.

Virtual Attendance

The Encampment will be viewable via Zoom by non-delegates who are members of the Department in good standing but will be muted and not able to participate in discussions or ask questions.

Decorum and Protocol

- a) The Encampment will begin at 1:00 p.m. Delegates should arrive 30 minutes early to avoid last-minute congestion at the registration table.
- b) At all times, discourse between Brothers should be respectful and cordial and in keeping with our core values of Fraternity, Charity, and Loyalty. Never interrupt or speak over the person who has the floor.
- c) Never walk between the Altar, where the Bible is placed, and the Department Commander's station while the meeting is in progress.
- d) To address the Encampment or ask a question, step to the floor microphone placed conveniently near the seating area, salute the Commander, and wait to be recognized. Once recognized, (a) state your name (b) your title and (c) your Camp name. End your remarks with a salute to the Commander.

Promoting the memory of the Union Soldiers and Sailors who fought to preserve the Union and keeping fresh the ideals of the *Grand Army of the Republic* are our primary goals. Let us keep that foremost in mind as we conduct our business and deliberations. I am looking forward to seeing you on May 4!

From Around the Department Brig. Gen. Joseph Bailey

Namesake of Camp 5, Department of Texas and Louisiana, located at Shreveport, LA

Brig. Gen. Joseph Bailey, born May 6, 1825 in Ohio, is considered the saviour of the Union Army under Maj. Gen. Nathaniel Banks, who commanded during the ill-fated Red River Campaign. After Banks' tepid leadership led to the near-destruction of his army at the Battle of Sabine Crossroads (April 8-9, 1864), also called by the Confederates the Battle of Mansfield (April 7, 1864) and the Battle of Pleasant Hill (April 8, 1864), he and his army retreated to Alexandria. There, they reunited with the United States naval armada commanded by Admiral David D. Porter. His Mississippi flotilla consisted of ten ironclads, three monitors, eleven tinclads, one timberclad, one ram and numerous support vessels. Their progress downriver had been stymied by low water on the Red River, unusual following the spring melt of winter snows in southern Arkansas, which had left other rivers in high-water or flood stages. This was likely due to the Confederate forces at Shreveport destroying a dam at Tones Bayou, which diverted the waters of the Red River into Bayou Pierre, a tributary west of the Red. The falling waters had left the Red River impassable at Alexandria, where rocks and ancient geological upliftings created rapids that gave the area, Rapides Parish, its name.

Bailey, then a colonel and an engineer by trade, was Acting Engineer of the 19th Corps, and convinced Banks and Porter that a wing dam would allow the water to pool and allow the fleet to escape. Using sailors and the idle soldiers to fell trees and build the dam, the fleet - the bulk of the Union Navy not employed blockading Confederate ports - was saved. Troops who would prove invaluable in the capture of Atlanta and actions in other Southern states later in 1864 and 1865, lived to fight another day.

Bailey earned the official Thanks of Congress and was elevated to Brigadier General by President Abraham Lincoln. He was dubbed by the press "the Hero of the Red River."

He ended his federal service in June 1865 and moved with his family to Vernon County in southwest Missouri. There, he was elected sheriff. In 1867, while pursuing livestock thieves, Bailey was shot and killed. His murder has never been solved.
